Course Description:	The primary objective of this course is to give a critical-constructive perspective of English Language Teaching (ELT) in India. The course will focus on current practices in ELT in the country at primary, secondary and tertiary levels as well as at the institutions for professionals. A comprehensive view of the status of English in India, the language policy with special reference to English, teacher preparation, the materials in use at various levels in teaching English will form a major part of the course. The course will give a historical perspective of ELT in India. In that context a discussion of the approaches and techniques in second language pedagogy evolved across the world over the last 50 years will be discussed.

Course Description:	This course will provide an opportunity for participants to advance their understanding of conducting research in ESL by looking at purposes and types of research, research variables, research questions and hypotheses, and the methodological details of quantitative, qualitative and mixed-methods research. The course will also help the participants to critically review literature relevant to the domain of English Language Teaching and various topics in it such as language development, cognitive, socio-cognitive paradigms, and communicative and affective factors that influence the developmental process of SL/FL learning.

Course Description:	<p>This course is an introduction to the teaching of English as a second/foreign language. The course will introduce seminal language teaching methods and approaches like GTM, direct approach, audio-lingual method, communicative method, desuggestopedia, TPR, bilingual approach, lexical approach, community based and multiple intelligence based approaches. Alongside, it will introduce the rationale for development of the methods, focus of teaching, role of teachers and learners, and materials and assessments used in each approach to teach English as a second/foreign language. Satisfactory completion of the course indicates that learners would have acquired a basic knowledge of the methodology of ELT and a limited skill in putting that knowledge into practice.</p>

Course Title	An Overview of Development of Teaching Materials (C)

It will also discuss materials developed to teach ELT according to the different paradigms of language learning namely cognitive, naturalistic, communicative and social constructivism. Furthermore, it will expose students how different syllabuses emanating from these perspectives are put into practice in the form of teaching materials. So students will be acquainted with different types of material designs to teach listening, speaking, reading and writing along with vocabulary and grammar.

The course will identify different genres of literature and analyze them for their linguistic content, grammatical and syntactic aspects. It will also help students design tasks and activities by using different forms of literature in order to develop different language skills.

Course Description:	It is an introductory course that aims to provide students with an overview of the field of Applied Linguistics. It seeks to familiarize students with the application of theories of language to issues in the areas of second language acquisition, second language teaching, bi/multilingualism, psycholinguistics, and sociolinguistics. The course aims to equip students of ELE with an understanding of key concepts in language teaching/learning and classroom research (for example, phonology, collocation, comprehensible input, LAD, communicative competence, learner autonomy, learning difficulties, teacher talk, etc.). The course will involve designing tasks and units for teaching and making presentations

Course Title	Fundamental concepts of Digital Literacy (C)

Course Description:	<p>This course helps you explore the impact new technologies have on language use and language learning, and arrive at a better understanding of the concept of digital literacy. The course is helpful if you intend to use the internet and/or digital tools in your ESL classroom. It is also a prerequisite for two level 2 courses – Evaluating online language learning and Digital literacy: use of web 2.0 tools in the ESL classroom.</p> <p>The course is delivered in four modules. The first module looks at student engagement with digital content in and out of classrooms, and how they interact with each other in a digital culture or context. In the second module, using UN Sustainable Development Goals as the supporting framework, the course links the idea of digital literacy with larger local and global contexts. The third module starts by looking at multiliteracies as a framework to explore new modes of literacy. And, in the last part, we learn how and why students need to be made digitally literate. This module also addresses the question: “why is digital literacy the responsibility of the English teacher?” The course ends by exploring some examples of how digital literacy is taught in ESL classrooms.</p>

Learners will be led to understand what encompasses authentic materials and how to use them effectively. Besides learning the theory, concept and principles related to the use of such materials, a considerable part of the course will be devoted to compiling and trialing of authentic materials for various groups of learners in the ELT classroom.</p> <p>The number of participants is restricted to 24. Course Descriptions:	<p>Few would argue with the fact that communication is the backbone of our society. Competence in communication is indispensable for self-actualization, relationship building, and contributing to societal development.</p> <p>Of all forms of interpersonal communication, public speaking is the most vital and curiously the most dreaded. Though dating back many centuries, it still remains one of the most important skills to acquire and to hone. It is indisputable that, she/he who masters public speaking will have a definite edge over all others in their personal and professional lives.</p> <p>This course on Public Speaking is narrowly focused on (i.e. it does not address broader communication issues or skills) a how-to “formula” covering basic speech preparation and delivery “mechanics.”</p> <p>At the end of the course, learners would have, through interactive lectures; classroom discussions; interactions with good speakers; analysis of digital learning materials; reviews of live and recorded speeches; and several rounds of practice speeches, acquired adequate knowledge of the formulae and mechanics of planning and delivering speeches and also gained satisfactory competence in giving speeches confidently, fluently and impressively.</p>
Evaluation Scheme	<p>Evaluation will have two parts: Internal and end of term.</p> <p>Internal assessment worth 50 marks will be based on tests/quizzes/ assignments/ simulations/ contribution to class discussions.</p> <p>The end of term examination will carry 50 marks.</p>

Course Title	English Language Teaching in Multilingual Contexts (C)

Course Description:	This course will introduce you to the base concepts of bi/multilingualism in India (grassroots versus elite bilingualism) and the assumptions that underlie the nature of proficiency in bilinguals (CUP, ALP and CLP). We will use the Freirian principles of teaching and learning, and the Brunerian notion of scaffolding as a perspectival lens to help us critique existing Indian ELT classroom practices. This critique will be supported by an in depth reading of some seminal articles supported by an investigation into current research work done in the Indian context.

Course Description:	<p>Institutions of education fulfill several roles in modern societies: they are centres for the production of knowledge, for imparting competence and discipline to future workers, for debating and transmitting socially relevant “values” to future citizens. In recent decades, educational institutions and curricular practices have been critically re-examined by scholars and activists involved in the new social movements -- feminism, anti-race struggles, and anti-caste movements -- as being linked to questions of power.</p> <p>This course aims to reflect critically on educational theory and practice today with focus on alternative pedagogical perspectives to engage with some of the compelling questions raised by political communities related to academic discourses, institutional practices, public policy documents and its relation to gender, caste, class, community, etc.</p> <p>We shall critically engage with texts by thinkers like Gandhi, Phule, Tagore, Ambedkar, Krishnamurthy, Arnold, Dewey, Freire, Giroux, Apple, McLaren, and hooks and others.</p>

Course Title	Teaching Grammar (C)

Course Description:	Teaching Grammar aims at introducing the participants to a perspective on modern English grammar which supports the teaching learning of the form of the language. The course is designed in such a way that the participants will learn firstly the fundamentals of learners' grammar and secondly different ways to teach them. Participants will learn to teach Grammar in the context of the language skills: listening, speaking, reading and writing. Classroom praxis will involve various communicative learning strategies that will be interactive, problem solving and learning centred in nature. Participants will be required to read and review grammar items presented in different standard grammar books besides participating in the activities related to the peer teaching.

Possessed with a critical understanding of the issues related to the various stakeholders involved in language teaching and learning, the participant will be able to enter an English language classroom with dependable knowledge and assuring Confidence.</p>

Classroom activities will help you understand and question concepts and practices including assessment, autonomy, blended learning, feedback, interaction, learner’s role teacher’s role etc., in light of theory and your personal experiences. As part of course evaluation, you will independently identify an issue, conduct research and present the findings in a report.</p>

Course Title	Corpus Linguistics and Second Language Teaching (E)

Course Description:	<p>This course Corpus and vocabulary teaching focuses corpus studies describing the approaches that employ sophisticated computer tools and quantitative techniques. As ESL teaching explores the use of various authentic materials, corpus 'concordancing' helps in pedagogical applications in vocabulary learning. This course introduces corpus-based research and presents several case studies that illustrate how corpus findings can be directly relevant to classroom teaching and materials development and vocabulary learning. Specifically the course describes how corpus-based analysis can be employed for enhancing learner's vocabulary in language teaching classroom. This course also examines the relationship between corpus linguistics (CL) vocabulary and language teaching (LT) and provides an overview of the most important pedagogical applications of corpora. It aims to illustrate that this relationship is a dynamic one in which the two fields greatly influence each other.</p>
