<b>Course description</b>	<p>Overview: This course gives an introduction to <i>Hangeul</i>, the Korean script, its vowels, consonants and <i>Batchim</i>, a combination of double consonants and its pronunciation to enable students to identify and write Korean alphabets in the right way. The course would further introduce the basic structure of Korean language (SOV), use of particles, verb conjugation and sentence endings equipping them with basic vocabulary and enabling them to form simple sentences and comprehend expressions of daily use.</p> <p>Aim: The course aims to enable students to identify and write Korean alphabets in the right way and form basic sentences on self-related and everyday topics.</p> <p>Learning Outcomes: <b>a) domain specific outcomes</b> b) value addition/ <b>c)</b> skill-enhancement/ <b>d)</b> employability quotient</p> <p>Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Identify Korean alphabets</li><li>• Form words</li><li>• Compose simple sentences and comprehend expressions of daily use.</li></ul>

<b>Course description</b>	<p>Overview: The main focus of the course is to stimulate the student's listening skill to strengthen communicative competence of Korean language by employing listening strategies for various types of listening texts. To enhance the listening of Korean sounds, characters and words, students would be required to comprehend short passages or conversations by listening to audios or videos. Students will learn proper pronunciations and intonations of Korean sounds to enable speaking of simple sentences and indulge in basic conversation in Korean with a given topic for a beginner level. To strengthen their communicative competency, students will be encouraged to make basic conversations including expressions related to the the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• exchange greetings,</li><li>• introduce oneself,</li><li>• identify things,</li><li>• use kinship terms for addressing and reference,</li><li>• making requests,</li><li>• talking about likes and dislikes.</li></ul> <p>Oral presentation and role-play will be helpful in improving speaking and listening skills.</p> <p>Aim: This course aims to involve students in exercises for language comprehension and getting familiarised with common expressions in conversation of daily use and etiquette.</p> <p>Learning outcomes: a) <b>domain specific outcomes</b> b) value addition/ c) skill-enhancement/ d) employability quotient</p> <p>Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Develop and enhance listening skills</li><li>• Speak standard Korean with proper pronunciations and intonations</li><li>• Make basic conversation using common expressions</li></ul>

Furthermore, the course is designed to develop students' composition skills to write short sentences correctly using basic vocabulary and grammatical structures.</p> <p>Aim: This course intends to introduce beginner level forms of Korean texts with basic vocabulary and expressions and develop writing skills of the students.</p> <p>Learning Outcomes: <b>a) domain specific outcomes</b> b) value addition/ c) skill-enhancement/ d) employability quotient</p> <p>Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Read fluently and comprehend short text/passages.</li><li>• Answer questions based on the given text, in written form.</li><li>• Compose short, grammatically correct sentences.</li></ul>
